This registration is not just for the new Volunteering system but is the preferred method for updating your personal details held on the new Members database. We transferred the information from the old to the new database wholesale, so if there was any info out of date then it remains so until members register and update their profile. Contact us by email and quote your name and BMMC membership number and we will update your email address on the system allowing you to register. When you receive confirmation of your email update then please follow the registration instructions.

#### VOLUNTEERING

Competition Secretaries (Now known as Volunteering Co-ordinators) Their role in the system is to enter the event and add information as it becomes available. there are various fields and drop down lists for them to use to simplify the process, they should enter as much information as is available at the outset and add to it if more information becomes available.

There is the facility to add documents to the system for example sign on instructions, event timetables etc. As marshals volunteer the volunteers are collated and saved. If a marshal is unable to volunteer using the online system they can still contact their competition secretary or BMMC registered chief marshal and they are able to add the name to the list providing the marshal is a BMMC member. This removes the need for anyone to manually collate all of the BMMC volunteer



Harewood

Information from 2020

**The Members Meeting** of 2nd August saw an entry of 75 compete for the first time this year. With both Harewood & the FTD championships cancelled, no new class or hill records will be made; but all times are recorded & the best still counts as a class win or position - but without a trophy or points.

The start procedure differs this year, with MSUK restrictions imposed on clubs to reduce handling of cars to the line; a car is now driven to a mark 500mm behind the timing beam; rather than the usual 100mm. The time starts when the beam is broken after that half-metre.

FTD went to Trevor Willis - in his OMS 28 racing car on his only timed run in 49.66 seconds, ahead of Lee Griffiths - OMS 25, 54.19s & Henry Pick - OMS 3000M, 54.34s. Most drivers completed two practice & four timed runs during the day, & a finish before 5pm ensued.

**Summer Holiday Hillclimb**, 30th August saw a larger entry of 95 competing, again with two practice & four timed runs. FTD was taken by ex-pat. Yorkshireman Johnathan Varley - GWR Raptor in 51.18-s, ahead of local OMS constructor Steve Owen - OMS 28, 52.88s & Harry Pick - OMS 3000M, 53.53s. The only real delay was when young Jake Bellerby in his modified Sylva Riot kit car, took a very wide line into Orchard - damaging the car & some of the hedge, along with an intermediate timing reflector; requiring a full-lift back to the paddock. Again, a pre-5pm finish for all.



**The Acespeed Motorsport Hillclimb**, 19th September had an entry of 84, run in warm & dry conditions. FTD went to Sean Gould in the 'works' Gould GR59bj with a 48.39s run, ahead of Harry Pick - OMS 3000M, 51.70s & Adam Greenen -Empire Evo 2, 52.21s. Five runs were offered, & most took advantage of them.

## Speed & Hillclimb Cont'd

Adding extra spice to the event, a 'shootout' element, based on how much a driver improved on the 'bogey - time' set for each class; the more the bogey is beaten by, the more points gained & cash won. The winner was John Prickett in a Radical PR6 with 20.04 & £100; from Steve Darley - Subaru Team Legacy - 19.92 & £50; and Sean Gould - Gould GR59bj -19.65 & £25.

**The final Harewood event** was the September Sunday Shootout on 20th September, with an entry of 88, also run in warm & dry conditions.

Again five runs were on offer, & most competitors obliged. FTD went to Sean Gould - Gould GR59bj with a 48.76s run, ahead of the shared Empire Evo 2 of Adam Greenen, 51.99s & brother Andy, 52.21s. During practice, a single-seater vaulted the inside tyre barrier between Clark's & Thomsons - landing upside down; requiring rescue & ambulance attending. Once released, he was taken to the paddock, not wishing to go to hospital & his car was retrieved at lunch-time. An afternoon 'off' for another car at Quarry required the second deployment of the emergency services.

The Sunday 'shootout' result was first : Steve Darley in his Subaru Team Legacy - 20.22 winning £100; from James Kerr - Peugeot 205 GTi, 19.63, &  $\pm$ 50; and Sean Gould - Gould GR59bj &  $\pm$ 25.

## **Club History**

**Our club** - the BMRMC as it was then, was formed back in 1957 in a hotel in Birmingham. Three regions were formed shortly afterwards - namely the South, the Midlands & the North; in later years - other regions or divisions followed.

The 'North-East Splinter Group' was formed as an offshoot from the North region in 1959, to provide marshals for motorsport events in the region. After a year or so the Council had enough confidence in the 'group' & it was elevated to a region in it's own right.

Our Chairpersons to date:

**Tony Hodgetts** (1960 to 1962) was appointed our first Chairman. Tony was an accountant by profession - reaching a senior position within the Appleyard Motor Group (Ian Appleyard of Alpine Rally fame in NUB 120 - the Jaguar XK120) prior to retirement. He was an active competitor with the Airedale & Pennine MC, & with a group of others, recruited a number of marshals to the NE Region, who marshalled at events in all disciplines. He had been a regular club steward & judge for BARC at Harewood & Oulton Park, amongst other events.





**Garth Nicholls** (1962 to ?) had moved from the northwest area (North region) with a change of job in 1959, to the Yorkshire area, becoming part of the 'NE SG' & joined the committee straight away. As family pressures increased for Tony, he stepped down & Garth took over, holding the post for a number of years.

**Les Bentley** (? 1970's ?) was a Customs & Excise official by profession; & became the organiser for airfield control, & later the airfield security team at the Grand Prix each year when Silverstone turned into the busiest airport in the UK for a day, as VIP's & high-paying guests made their way to Northamptonshire by helicopter for hospitality & maybe an occasional glance at the racing !

**Geoff Hemingway** (? 197? to 1982) was MD of a machine-manufacturer for regrinding turbine blades for jet engines. The company was part of a larger group: - RHP - the roller-bearing manufacturers. Geoff was known by many as 'Lord Hemingway of Dalby', as he was a regular stage commander for rallies run in the North Yorkshire forests, & Dalby in particular.

**Richard Ashton** (1982 to 1989), Richard was a medical rep. & was a crew-member of Northern Race & Rally Rescue Marshals Club - one of the early- formed rescue units. They were involved with BRSCC N & Donington Emergency Services units, in the rescue of the crew of a British Midlands Airways Fokker F27 on a training flight from East Midlands airport as it crashed at Kegworth, on the M1 banking, in January 1987. Richard then formed Calder Rescue - attending rallies & other events, including power-boat racing !

**Chris Ruddlesdin** (1989 to 1993) was a senior orthopaedic surgeon in Barnsley (a 'Mr' not a Doctor); & regular MO on rallies & at Cadwell Park. Chris is now a lock-keeper on the Aire & Calder Navigation, at Whitley Bridge, near Knottingley.

**Amanda Trasler** (nee Goodwin) 1993 to 1997) was a sales rep. for a maternity products company, & became the region's first female Chairwoman - a milestone for the club. After stepping down from the Chair, Amanda married a farmer in the West Midlands area.









**Mike Shorley** (1997 to 2012) was a Quality Manager for Philidas - a company making industrial fasteners, including for car makers. I recall Mike telling me about visits to Ford's huge factory in Genk, Belgium. Philidas was part of the RHP group, mentioned in Geoff Hemingway's profile. Mike also competed in club rallies for a time, in various cars. For some of his time on National Council he was the National Hillclimb & Sprint officer.

**John Watson** (2012 to 2019), John was an electronics engineer initially, repairing musical keyboards, before moving on & ending his working life as an area manager for a national funeral company. John was former Chief Marshal at Cadwell Park, & for MGCC. John is now the regular Radio Controller at Cadwell Park.

Finally, we reach our current Chair...

Lynne Kendall (2019 to date) Lynne is on the Senior Management Team for an Independent Specialist College responsible for Data, Finance, over 9 sites, spread Educational Contracts, Quality Assurance & Compliance. Lynne has marshalled for 36 years at numerous venues, & is a regular Post Chief and Specialist at Cadwell. Lynne first started on the NE Committee as Grading Officer at the end of 2009 before also taking on the Newsletter editor role as well and held these roles for many years before passing on the batten. Lynne has been our regional Training Officer for over 9 years and has been the BMMC National Training Officer for six years. Lynne is also an MSUK Lead Trainer & a member of MSUK's Training Advisory Group. The NE membership votedin Lynne as the new NE Chair at 2019's AGM.








It certainly never seems to get any easier. So I thought we would give you an insight into the REAL world of motorsport from a competitors point of view.


Motorsport is a rich man's sport; always has been since the early pioneers of our sport back in the early 1900's. #### Parent - Teenage anguish

A mother calls the DAS Counselling Service, distraught at the behaviour of her teenage daughter. The caller showed signs of feeling angry, upset and very frustrated by her daughter, Although the mother phoned about her daughter, in the counselling we concentrate on the caller and how she feels.

Together we look at ways that she could rebuild the channels of communication between herself and her daughter. We help her to look at the situation through the eyes of her daughter.

Over a series of calls, and a lot of work in between calls by mum, they are able to rebuild their relationship.



Counsellors may be able to help you work through your problems and find ways of dealing with them. Remember, you choose when you call and what you talk about. Calls may be recorded to help check and improve our service standards.
