KART MARSHALS WANTED!

The Cheshire Kart Racing Club that races at Hooton Park, Ellesmere Port have told me that ideally they would like any carcircuit marshals who are interested in possibly helping out, to get in touch and give their names & contact numbers to the Club so they can call on them as needed.

They run events throughout the year at the Cheshire Kart Racing Club just North of Chester (off junction 6 of the M53) with meetings run on the third weekend of each month Feb to Nov.

The events are all day Sunday, covering a number of different classes running a practice, 3 heats and a final. Races are typically around 10 minutes long.

Each post typically has 1-2 marshals covering flags, incidents and driving standards observation reports to the Clerk.

Signing on starts around 9am followed by a marshals briefing at 9.30am.

HAIGH MAKES HISTORY 5 YEARS AFTER OULTON CRASH



I remember making my way back to the car at the end of the BRSCC's meeting at Oulton Park on 14th September 2013 and seeing the helicopter take off from the Medical Centre. I had heard that it was Flick Haigh who was onboard and wondered whether she would have any desire to race again.

Flick had lost control of her Caterham R300 at Druids and, with her car broadside across the track, she was T-boned by another competitor. Haigh was quite seriously injured sustaining 6 broken ribs, 5 chipped vertebrae and a bruised lung.

In her moment of greatest need, the Oulton Park marshals and rescue crews came to Haigh's aid. "I can't thank them enough for their efforts that day," Flick says, "The training they have is unbelievable! I owe my racing career to them as



any wrong move with a spinal injury can be catastrophic, yet despite that pressure, they remained so calm and helpful. The Medical Centre also provided amazing care particularly with regards to making sure I had the correct pain relief.

"I believe marshals are truly the forgotten heroes of motorsport. They allow us drivers to race safely, picking up the pieces when we get it wrong. Without marshals there is no racing."

It was late November before Flick got back into a racing car when she tested a Ginetta G55 as part of her rehabilitation during which she had to work tremendously hard on her fitness to reach the point where her racing licence was restored. This occurred - much to her delight - 6 months after the crash.

The following season she was lining up on grids once more as she took part in the VdeV Endurance Series behind the wheel of a Juno prototype. She told us, "I knew deep down I couldn't quit as I had too many ambitions however, I think it took a few days (after the Oulton accident) for me to process something like that and realise I still wanted to continue to be out on the track. Nonetheless, I was worried I wouldn't have my previous pace because I might suffer from fear due to knowing what can and could happen."

Over the next few years, although life on the circuits didn't always run smoothly, Flick built-up a reputation in sports car racing that resulted in her being signed by the Optimum Motorsport squad to co-drive their Aston Martin Vantage in the 2018 British GT Championship along-



side Jonny Adam who had already won the title in 2 of the previous 3 years. For Haigh, Jonny's experience, support and ability behind the wheel was a great source of confidence. Furthermore, his previous experience driving Aston Martin Vantages, greatly helped the Optimum Motorsport team who were new to the car.

They had a great start to the season at Oulton Park's traditional Easter Monday fixture with a victory in the tricky wet conditions that prevailed during the opening round before the second encounter was abandoned due to torrential rain. This was the first time a woman had taken a British GT overall race win.

Even better was to follow, as at the end of a consistent campaign which included another visit to the top step of the podium at Brands Hatch, the duo secured the championship setting new records in the process as no lady driver had previously taken the title while Adam was the first to win it 3 times. This was a fine swansong for their car as the V12-engined Vantage was in its final season of eligibility after 7 years of front-line competition.

For Flick clinching the title was "...un-

doubtedly the best day of my life!" Her joy was no doubt enhanced because the success came as something of a surprise. "I didn't enter the championship to win it in year one," she recalls, "especially as I had come from a few tough years racing GT3 in European championships, although I was looking forward to driving the Aston as no one had a bad word to say about the car.

"I knew British GT was super competitive and I didn't want to show my hand until I felt ready and good enough to be right on the pace. Assisting me to maintain that level throughout the season was our engineer Evert Van Doorn who is the calmest guy you could meet, he got the car in such a good place and made me feel confident while on track."

Although Flick had only previously thought about winning races and making progress in the sports car realm, taking the British GT title has resulted in her sights being set very high in the shape of taking the laurels at the 24 Hours of Le Mans!

She says, "I don't believe (I could be wrong!) a female has won the GT Class in that classic enduro... This year opened my eyes to how few women make it to the top and I am determined to change that.





I still can't park my road car but I can seem to drive around in circles fairly well!"

All this is a far cry from when Flick was younger at which time she competed in Advanced Level Dressage where she undertook the most difficult Grand Prix tests. She must have been as good on four legs as she is on four wheels because she had a shot at getting into the British Under 21 Team.

However, motor sport and cars were always part of her life when growing up because of her father's love of classic rallying although she didn't get the bug for taking part herself until she attended a corporate day at the Palmer Sport complex in Bedfordshire. Cars are far more fun than horses she declares, "There's no doubt 500 horse power is better than 1! I still have horses and ride when I can, but cars take the top spot for me now..."

Haigh began racing in Caterhams during 2007 before winning the Classic Graduate series in 2009. When she enjoyed her early success, she was often wearing her lucky knickers that bore the motto "Happy Day" although her superstitions now involve washing her road car before

a race weekend and enjoying a 20 minute nap before qualifying - I suspect there is some science going on here as no doubt these activities put her in the correct frame of mind

Flick is certainly not afraid of thinking outside of the box. At one time she installed a hot tub in her living room so that she could watch TV from it although that has since been removed because there was no where for her family and friends to sit!

The crash at Druids could have left Flick with life-changing injuries and destroyed the progress she was making with her motor racing career, indeed she could have even lost the ability to walk, but thanks in no small part to the skill of those who attended to her it is becoming an increasingly distant memory. "I've never spent too long since thinking about what happened," she says, "What doesn't kill you makes you stronger and I am true believer in that however I will be eternally grateful to the marshals and medics who were at Oulton that day."

For 2019, Flick is hoping to take a step closer to fulfilling her dream of becoming a winner at La Sarthe by finding a seat in the Blancpain GT Series Endurance Cup or European Le Mans Series although, as with many racing drivers, finding the necessary sponsorship is a sticking point.
