He set up and ran three airlines. He also took on Boeing and the aviation industry after one of his airliners crashed.



More recently, he was the lynchpin for Mercedes becoming a competitive team again, and bringing Lewis Hamilton into the team. Success after success followed the toothy Austrian whose early Grand Prix career was funded by a bank loan. His autobiography 'To Hell and Back' is a clinical dissection of his career and well worth seeking out. The word hero is an often over-used word - however, in this case he was one of mine.

TWO WEEKENDS

WEEKEND ONE:

FUN CUP OULTON PARK - TASTER DAY

It all starts with an enquiry.

This can be from a number of sources; Try Marshalling for a Day, various Recruitment Tents (more anon) Go Motorsport, Volunteers in Motorsport or via direct contact through other marshals etc.

I then compile a database of potential new marshals, I currently have in excess of 200 potential candidates. Prior to the taster day I invite all of those that have not attended a taster session nor committed to a future date. to join us on the next one. Typically I send out in excess of 100 emails every time. Responses vary from "yes please" to "if only...." "I'm on holiday". Some ask for more information "what's the start time?" "what do I need to bring?" "does it rain?" "I haven't got any orange overalls". All this despite the fact that I have outlined the day in previous e-mails and many I have already met on recruitment drives. All of these enquiries are responded to and information given where required.

I then collate a list of those attending, this includes only information for immediate attention such as contact details, ages, etconly the vital details that need to be shared, in addition I keep any information shared securely protected to comply with GDPR. This



is then sent to Margaret Simpson so that she can arrange tickets and Nadine Lewis so that she knows what to expect. Different preparations are required for different age groups. Under 18's need to be accompanied by a parent or guardian and I need to arrange consent forms etc before the event. Under 16's are restricted to the collection area so their experience is very different but they still need accompaniment, this is quite a small area so we sometimes have to restrict numbers.

About a week before the taster day I send out further instructions including a timetable of the day's racing and a reminder of what to expect and what to bring, I also include a circuit map highlighting where to park and where we meet. I check to make sure they have received tickets, if not I arrange that with Margaret (she makes me look good with her organisational skills).

Very often we get latecomers wanting to join us, circumstances change for those I have contacted previously or they have heard about the taster day from those that are coming, this is a lot easier now we have e-tickets and I can arrange things up to about 48 hrs before the event.

The day before the taster day I send out a final reminder of what to expect and a "tick box" check list of what they need, I also give a hint about the weather and what to wear. That evening I prepare all that I need for the next day: tabards (previously cleaned where necessary), membership packs, gloves, spare waterproofs if required. Oh! And my stuff too. On the morning I meet and greet our intrepid bunch, despite arranging for 10-15 attendees very often less than half actually appear despite all of the contact beforehand! It really is most dis-heartening to have all of the time consuming hard work turn out to be of no avail when you get a message the night before

saying they cannot attend. Or worse still just not turn up.

Yet again I describe what to expect from the day and try and discover their individual and collective hopes, it's a good opportunity to assess how keen they are and any "special" requirements they may have. I issue a numbered orange tabard which I then record on my register, with the understanding that if I don't get it back they will then get a bill from me! I take the opportunity to give some basic safety tips and explain why it's not a good idea to use a mobile phone for taking photographs of anything they see on track.



I quickly give Nadine a brief of what to expect from our now "Nadlings" before handing over to her to host the walk about. I take up my marshalling role for the day usually at an easily accessible post for ease of return.

At the end of the day's racing we all meet again, usually in the pit lane for a debrief of the day. Usually stories of great excitement are exchanged amongst our prospective new marshals. The bigger the story the more likely they are to return.

I hand out the aforementioned membership pack & explain what needs to be done to become a fully fledged member of the orange family. I include everything in the pack that they need-right down to the envelope to send it all off to Dave Reed. Very often there is a little something in the pack from one of our sponsors; a badge or key ring or just a little keepsake. I reclaim the tabards and pack it all away.

The job's not finished yet. The following week I send an e-mail to all that did not attend. Those that apologised are informed they will get future invites but only so many. Those that did not apologise are informed that if I do not hear from them then they will be removed from my database. The attendees are encouraged to join BMMC and help and advise freely given.

Very often I have become the main point of contact before all of the paperwork is completed and help them to volunteer for their first race meetings - arranging tickets etc and meeting them on the day to supply them with tabards and encouragement.

WEEKEND TWO F3/GT Races Easter Weekend Recruitment Days

Another Friday of preparation! This time for recruiting new members or more exactly inviting people for a taster day.

Checking over the requirements of the day and loading the car - it's a good job I have an





estate car as it appears half of the contents of my shed are loaded into it! The biggest part is the marquee which is quite heavy and cumbersome to manoeuvre. Again some preparation takes place many weeks earlier; booking space with MSV, arranging suitable passes etc and getting volunteers to help me "man" the tent.

Set up on a Saturday morning is at the least a two man job to erect the tent and "dress" it up. On this occasion I have been left on my own to sort it all out, thankfully the weather was on my side (not windy or rainy) so I had a fighting chance, but still not easy. The Saturday was very quiet, just as well because the pre-arranged help never materialised. Having to share marshals with the Avenue is perhaps not an ideal way.

The bank holiday Monday was much busier and I hardly had chance of a break and yet I was still all alone. I had arranged for additional help with them coming in on guest tickets but unfortunately they messaged me to say they were unable to attend.

I must say I do enjoy talking to people about our hobby and despite my best efforts at putting them off they still want to try a Taster day. I try to portray what we do, warts and all. The early starts, the wet weather, the freezing temperatures but equally being burnt to a crisp on a post - sometimes all on the same day! As for lunch breaks..... Prospective marshals need to have realistic expectations of what a marshal does.

During Saturday I had the pleasure of being joined by some of our younger cadet marshals. Whilst they don't have a comprehensive understanding of all of the marshalling roles and what happens at the circuit, they certainly know about their role and can communicate it to others of their age group easily.

In between talking to new prospects we had a bit of fun waving flags, discussing their use and hand signals etc. Pretty basic stuff really but still important for them going forward. There was great excitement when I entered into their new PRC how well (or otherwise) they had performed.

At the end of the day it all has to come down again and the jenga puzzle of how to fit it all in the car begins. Again a two man job. Again just me.
