COULD YOU HELP MENTOR THE MARSHALS OF THE FUTURE?

As part of the NW committee's focus on retention and developing new trainee marshals, we have been trialing a mentor scheme.

As we move towards the end of the 2019 season, we are now looking for marshals who would be willing to help this scheme in the 2020 season.

The way the scheme will work is outlined below;

Mentors will commit to a minimum 8 meetings at OP/Anglesey per annum.

Each mentor will be allocated 3-4 new marshals per season. This will be arranged when the "Welcome letters" to new members are sent out. At this point I will also advise the mentor.

The mentor's role is defined as:

- Being available at sign on to meet trainees.
- Track /Experienced Track / IO/ Specialist / Flag grade.
- Able to coach / guide new trainees.
- Give advice on grading etc.
- Be able to advise point of contact for queries if unable to respond.
- Be open to share their experiences with the trainee.
- Signpost to relevant information and guidance.
- Being available post meeting to discuss the day and help address any issues.

If a mentor is unavailable at a particular meeting, they may organise with a fellow marshal to deputise for them as a mentor for the day if needed.

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IT STARTED AT TY CROES-Part 2

For 2019, Matthew undertook a fairly major career change as he competed with a roof above his head for the first time - aside from his one-off 18th birthday outing in the Ginetta GT4 SuperCup - when he took the opportunity to drive an Aston Martin Vantage GT4 prepared by Academy Motorsport.

"We had been thinking about next steps part way through 2018," Cowley explains," and GT4 was one of the options. We were talking with Graham Brunton at the Walter Hayes and he suggested we contact Rachel, his daughter, who is the Sales and Marketing Manager for Aston Martin Racing. With the brand of Aston Martin, the new car and the AMR Academy Driver programme we decided this was the route to go.

"Two teams were kind enough to give me the opportunity to have a test session in the new car at Oulton Park in November. I got on well and really enjoyed not only driving the Aston but also the experience and the teams' input. The decision was then the tough one of who to drive with, and whether to do British GT or European GT- the latter is part of the Blancpain series. We chose to do European as the GT4 cars run in their own stand alone races and, with large grids, we could pit ourselves against a wide range of drivers while racing on some great circuits across the continent."

Compared to a Formula Ford 1600, Matthew has to make much greater use of his peripheral awareness when driving the mighty Aston as it is so much larger. Despite this, the sports car handles really well for a big car and has quite a pointy front-end like a single-seater although the additional weight means corner speed has to be judged accurately.

These were some of the attributes that Cowley had to focus on during the three preseason test days- two at Silverstone and one at Donington. They were quite a journey into the unknown, not only because of Matthew's lack of experience with this type of racing but also due to the Vantage being a brand new for model for 2019 and the Academy Motorsport team were running the first example to be built. They didn't know how close to the pace they were until they arrived at Monza's opening round.

One new dimension that competing in sports cars introduces is sharing the car with a co-driver. "In Formula Ford 1600s you win or lose according to your own performance once you are in the car," reflects Matthew, "With a team mate you have to consider what you have to do to allow them to take-over the car at the pit stop in a good position and set to get to the end. You can't punish the tyres in your stint as they still have a further half race distance to do, you also don't want to have contact with any one as that will affect the performance and handling, so unlike the Formula Ford, which you push to its limit for the whole race, we run the Aston at about





95% for the first stint. If you are the second driver out, you can push harder."

Because Academy Motorsport is a much larger operation and Cowley lives at home in Manchester while the team is based in Worcester, he has a less hands-on involvement from an engineering point of view compared to when he was with Team Pelfrey. Nonetheless, he does take an interest in what's happening with the cars at the track and how they are set up so that he can provide feedback to the engineers. He is also on hand during set up and dismantling at the track to provide assistance.

In the meantime, Matthew continues to build his understanding of technology via a distance course for a Diploma in Mechanical Engineering which fits well with the nomadic life of a racing driver.

As well as developing his knowledge, Cowley also works on all the attributes that are required when he is behind the wheel. Since 2016 he has been part of three-time World Touring Car Champion Andy Priaulx's 'Young

Driver Development Programme' and regularly attends the iZone "boot camp", which Priaulx co-founded, where he is coached on the simulator by John Pratt and Enzo Mucci- with fellow rising star Jordan Albert the guy he usually goes head to head with.

Away from this structured training Matthew has formed friendly rivalries on the digital circuits of iZone with the Maini brothers - Kush and Arjun - who are Indian nationals that race in Formula Renault Eurocup and F2/LMP2 respectively.

The programme is one element of a multipronged scheme Cowley is undertaking to maximise his potential. Another aspect is the training he is undertaking at Darren Turner's Base Performance, where Turner's fellow Aston Martin factory driver, Jonny Adam, is coaching him on the simulator and fitness coach, John Camilleri, undertakes a benchmarking process now that Matthew has been selected for the AMR Academy Driver programme. He has also been working with Greg Searle, a gold medal winner in Olympic and World Championship rowing, on mindfulness and preparation.



Anyone who gets to know Matthew and his family quickly become aware that they have a strong sense of social responsibility. Their first trainee guide dog, Truffle, was a familiar sight in the Formula Ford 1600 paddock a few years ago although he has since become a family pet as, despite being used to the noise



of motorsport, he was still startled by sudden bangs in urban situations and so was deemed unsuitable to assist a blind person.

Following the community spirited example of his parents, Matthew supports the Shaw Mind Foundation mental health charity. The connection arose almost by chance. One of their ambassadors, Marsha Wright, approached Cowley to ask him to promote via his Twitter account their petition to make mental health education compulsory in schools to help them generate enough signatures to ensure the matter was debated in parliament.

Matthew felt he could give them more support than this and so he met their founder, Adam Shaw, and became an ambassador himself. He continues to promote the charity's activities and the publications they produce via Trigger Publishing through logos on his car and his Twitter account.

He has also become involved with the Nordoff Robins Music Therapy Charity, helping to promote their work using music as a therapy for people with life-limiting illnesses, disabilities and feelings of isolation through his social media and logos on the car.

It is encouraging that a local kid from Manchester who showed a keen pair of heels to his friends at a karting party can go on to travel the World enjoying the sport that he loves and has a talent for. No doubt the marshals from our region will be keen to follow his exploits in the future.
