Chairman's Chatter

Well another Walter Hayes Trophy meeting marks the end of the marshalling year at Silverstone. Where has the year gone, it seems like it was only yesterday that we were preparing for the start of the season. What a busy and controversial year it has been what with the introduction of the new "Marshals Pathway" and the proposal to race without flags! The initial pathway proposals caused some heated debates but happily changes were introduced that show the powers that be have listened to reason. If you just want to continue marshalling in your current role there is no need to change. The revised Pathway does provide opportunities to cross train across roles if you wish. My new registration card says I am a Race: Grade



3 (Post Chief/ IO) Marshal Assessor. In fact my actual role is Post Chief, I have not trained as an IO, nor as a Specialist/Off Track marshal. We are going to have to adapt our thinking about grades and roles.

Again, the concept of racing without flags has proved to be controversial, in practice it doesn't seem to work. The powers that be seem to be moving towards the view that flags take precedence and lights support the flags! However, I think we must accept that the light panels are more visible than the flags. One thing we have learnt from this exercise is that not all flag points or light panels are necessarily in the best positions. There is going to have to be some shuffling around. Some Flag points will move and some light panels will also move. I believe it is accepted that the lights should be operated from the flag points and to maintain safety they should be protected with appropriate debris fencing and weather protection.

There are some significant changes happening at Silverstone this winter. Work has already started on breaking ground for the new International Kart Circuit which is being built in the green space behind Luffield and will incorporate the old Bridge – Priory area. The intention is that the International Kart track will be capable of splitting into two National size Kart circuits with separate race controls. I wonder where the marshals will come from?

Regional AGM Report

Thank you to everyone who attended our Regional AGM on Saturday October 29th, which was followed by the announcement of our annual awards and our Regional Dinner. I hope you have all had time to read our Regional Annual Report, which gives a summary of all the Committee activities in South Midlands region during 2022. If you have any questions, comments or concerns please contact the relevant Committee Member via their contact details.

The AGM is an important milestone in our Committee year. It is the time for the Committee to report back to the members on what we have been doing on your behalf, and for you to decide whether you want us to continue doing it! This is the second year that we have published a Regional Annual Report ahead of the AGM, where each member of the Committee summarises what they have been doing within their area of responsibility. By publishing the report in this way, you have the chance to read it and raise any questions, rather than just have the reports read out during the AGM, and we know from your feedback that this more open approach has been well received.

We also hold the elections to the Committee at the AGM. It might seem strange that we have elections every year, but the BMMC Rules require that at least one third of the Regional Committee must retire every year, and, if those people want to continue on the Committee, they must stand for re-election. As our Committee is currently 10 people that means that 4 must retire every year, as we must "round up" to the nearest number divisible by 3. A second Rule states that no Committee member can be in post for more than three years without being re-elected, so that guides who must retire and stand for re-election. This year the 4 Committee Members who retired were Chris Whitlock, Marion Quarrington, Glynn Ellis and Adrian Cashmore – all stood for re-election and were successfully voted unopposed to serve back on the Committee by those at the AGM. A third Rule states that the Regional Chair is elected by the Committee from amongst their number. As Chris had retired from the Committee before the AGM, he had also effectively retired as Regional Chair, and so, at our first Committee meeting after the AGM, he was re-elected unopposed as the Regional Chair again. It may seem such a lot of trouble to end up with no changes, but our Club Rules are there to make sure that the Regional Committees are representing their members, and that the members can make changes should they feel the need to do so.

At the AGM we were delighted to recognise that June Copeland had been awarded an Honorary Membership of BMMC, following the sad death of George earlier in the summer. June was our guest at the Regional Dinner, and also presented one of our Regional Trophies. This year our Member of the Year is Ian Greenwood, a Track Marshal at Silverstone, who has demonstrated that, despite suffering a serious illness, he has persevered with marshalling in 2022 and has provided strong leadership and guidance for new marshals on his own initiative. Unfortunately, Ian was not able to join us in the evening but had been surprised by being presented with his award by Chris at sign-on for the Birkett that morning. Our Trainee of the Year, and recipient of the Lesley Harris Trophy, is Ian Whiting, a Trainee Track Marshal at Silverstone. Ian readily offered to take on a committee role when the grading officer post became vacant and, despite having the challenge of adapting to the new marshal's pathway, has offered sound advice and answers to queries regarding grading issues. - discussed the concern that the details of the new training modules still had not yet been published by the time your Regional Training Officer, Matt, was due to start planning for the training to be delivered in 2023. However, Matt and his team have started their planning using the outlines that are available and will need to catch up once the full details are published.
- the team continue to host and plan Taster Days at Silverstone for potential new marshals, but we get more
 requests than we can sometimes deal with. A lot of work goes into planning a Taster Day and we need at
 least three people to help show them round during the morning. If you are willing to give up half a day to
 help with hosting, our Membership Secretary, Steve, would be pleased to hear from you on
 <u>sm.members@marshals.co.uk</u>. Please look out for the Taster Day people if they come through your area
 next season and help out with any questions. We regularly see some of our Taster Day people marshalling
 at events and gaining upgrades, so we know Taster Days are successful at attracting and keeping marshals.
- discussed a concern that new marshals are not well supported on their first day marshalling at Silverstone, that they may not get enough advanced information to help them prepare for the day or much help to settle in. A small working group has been formed to look into what we can do as a club to welcome new marshals immediately before and during their first day.
- held a recruitment event at Motorsport Days Live with 20 people leaving their details and many more taking leaflets. The exhibition side of the event was not as large as previous years, but we had a good location right next to the only food stall at the event so had plenty of footfall! - discussed whether we should accept adverts from outside (ie non-BMMC) sources in the Newsletter, and decided that we cannot do this at this time.

Grading Gripes

Greetings everyone, I hope you have enjoyed a fun filled racing season and are all preparing for a well-earned rest over the festive period.

Having completed my first year as the regional grading officer, which has been very much a year for learning, I would like to give a big thank you to everyone for your support and understanding.

This year has seen many proposed changes and following the announcement of the new grading pathway, BMMC South Midlands were the first region to hold an open meeting in order to discuss questions, views and concerns.

The new Pathway was initially expected to be introduced in August 2022, this has now been extended until June 2023, this will allow an extended period for upgrades to be submitted on the current system.

I would like to remind everyone that the upgrade process is laid out in the PRC with the number of days required and how many training days are needed.

As mentioned in the previous newsletter

Here are some of the common reasons why upgrades must be referred.

- 1. No marshal registration form (MRF) supplied. These are available at MSUK under marshals-resources
- 2. Dual duties recorded and counted towards upgrade. Dual duties are not able to be used and you must only record the 1 duty for the day.
- **3.** Incorrect training signatures. Some upgrades such as experienced grades require 2 training days which must be at least 1 year apart.
- **4.** Time expired signatures. Attendance signatures are valid for 3 years and training for 2 years. Please remember that we must all attend training days every 2 years or bi-annually.
- 5. Non completion of all modules for training signatures.

Why not use the cut out that was supplied in the previous newsletter as an aid memoir providing simple steps to upgrading and where and how to send off your upgrade request?

Don't forget to get your upgrades in and if you need advice before submitting then please do drop me a line.

Race Meetings All New Marshals Should Try

A New Year a new beginning, 2023 brings a return of favourite race meetings that new marshals should/must experience. The season usually kicks off with the Pomeroy, a Vintage and Sports Car Club event. Not really a full-bodied race meeting but a collection of tests and races for some vintage cars. Teamwork?

I have seen some actions recently that make me question whether we are truly working together as a team. I have seen marshals out on track dealing with incidents without any yellow flag or light cover and I am not the only one. I have had reports from other marshals of similar incidents. It goes without saying this is dangerous and stupid! What is the hiarchy of safety that we are all taught? Look after yourself first, then your colleagues, and lastly the driver (they have a strong cage around them)! It is clear then that if marshals are working on track without yellow cover they are not looking after number one and those responsible for providing that cover are not looking after their colleagues!

But closer examination of some of these incidents shows there might be a common thread. A flag point was not manned or light panel might not have a designated operator. What to do in such circumstances? Why not turn on the lights locally? It only requires someone to press the appropriate yellow button; then they can attend the incident and turn off the light when they return to post. Just because you have signed on as a track/incident marshal it doesn't mean you can't step into another role for a second. You still have a responsibility to look after your own safety and if you do switch a yellow light on then you are looking after your colleagues as well! All track marshals have to undertake some flag days if they want to progress, why not put that experience to use and wave a flag?

But it is not just track marshals who are not working as a team. At the CSCC Silverstone meeting in October a car stopped next to the pit wall on fire. Not one Pit marshal thought to grab a fire extinguisher to help put out the fire despite a few rushing to the scene to see what was going on.

A marshal is a marshal no matter what their normal role, we should be able, capable, and willing to work together as a team.
